### A New Horizon in Turkey

There have been proposals to institute school social work, together with other support services in schools, since the 1980's. Although social work and psychological services are available for students at the university level, to date school social work has not been established in the public schools. Now The Strategy of National Children's Rights and Action Plan for the years 2013 – 2017 provides for setting up school social work in all public schools by 2016. This will be a huge task for a population of 75 million where 24% is under 14 years of age.

## **Changing Names in Bulgaria**

There are about 830 support personnel in Bulgaria's 3000 schools to help school children with issues such as emotional problems, disabilities, inclusion and child protection. The titles and training of the personnel are complex and have changed over the years along with political change and new education laws. Currently a school psychologist or pedagogical counselor is appointed, depending on the needs of the school, with some professionals serving 2 or 3 schools. Training is in psychology or social work with either a Bachelors or Masters degree.

## **Social Work for Special Needs in Greece**

School social workers (σχολικός κοινωνικός λειτουργός) are appointed by the Ministry of Education to perform all the typical roles, but only in schools for children with special needs. The ongoing economic crisis has produced additional stress for children and families, but the absence of social workers in regular public schools makes it impossible for schools to provide the extra material and emotional support that school children need in difficult times.
