5th International School Social Work Conference to be in Accra, Ghana

The 5th International School Social Work Conference will be held in Accra, Ghana April 10 through 13, 2012. The official announcement was graced by government officials, members of the diplomatic missions, representatives of corporate organizations, humanitarian and civil society organizations, university lecturers, members of the School Social Work Association of Ghana, educationists, students and the media. In a speech delivered on her behalf, the Minister for Education, Mrs. Betty Mould Iddrisu, expressed happiness that the conference would be held in Africa and stated that Ghana and Africa look forward to the learning experiences to be gained from sharing experiences and best practices, and comparing notes with international partners.

The Accra International Conference Centre was built in 1991 to host the Heads of States meeting of the Non-Aligned Movement. It is the largest conference centre in Ghana with a conference hall sitting capacity of 1600 and other meeting room facilities.



A Brief on Ghana

Ghana is found on the West coast of Africa with an area of 238,500 square kilometres and a population of approximately 24 million people. Ghana is highly multi-ethnic and multi-lingual and was the first country to gain independence in sub-Saharan Africa in 1957 and set the pace for other countries in Africa to follow suit. Ghana has enjoyed a stable democracy since 1992 and serves as a good example of a working democracy, peace and stability in the region. Our presidents often act as ambassadors of peace in the region. The role Ghana played in hosting the Liberia Peace Talks is an example of Ghana's role in fostering peace. Ghana has been referred to as an 'Island of Peace' within a region that is plagued with conflict.

Accra is in a savannah zone and experiences tropical savannah climate. The city hosts the National Museum, the National Theatre, the Kwame Nkrumah Mausoleum, a cultural and Art Centre, historic castles, and the Du Bois Centre which holds research works and the graves of the African American Scholar W.E.B. Du Bois and his wife Shirley Graham Du Bois.

In Ghana, education is a government priority hence several measures have been initiated to promote basic education for all children. The Ghana School Feeding Programme, the School Capitation Grant, free tuition, free textbooks and exercise books, and free school uniforms for deprived children are among government's laudable efforts at achieving basic education for all children in Ghana. A Girl's Education Unit has also been established within the Ghana Education Service to help achieve gender parity.

Ghanaians are among the friendliest people in Africa. Enjoy the Ghanaian warm *Akwaaba* when you arrive in our country. We have a rich cultural heritage. Each of the 10 regions in Ghana has its own beautiful and unique culture. Ghana has a wide range of traditional dances which every visitor to Ghana falls in love with.
